LAUREN KEELEY

Woman at War - a film by Benedikt Erlingsson about a seemingly normal middle-aged woman (Halla) who takes it upon herself to battle a powerful corporation trying to exploit and extract Iceland's natural resources whilst going through a personal process of adopting a child. The film creates a poignant but also humorous narrative around one of the most important issues of our time, clashing together the various forces at play: nature/power, people/corporations, mother/man. I wanted to make an image that would articulate these tensions in a playful tone as is voiced in the film: two hands, representing different powers, struggling over a plant.

SORAYA SMITHSON

Soraya Smithson's ceramic interpretation of Billy Wilder's 1959 romantic comedy, *Some Like It Hot* uses the window recesses of Newlyn Art Gallery's Picture Room to create a theatrical restaging of the film using handmade ceramic objects to represent the narrative. The transparency of film is exchanged for the solidity of ceramics, their thingness means they occupy space and become votive offerings to love, friendship, hope, desire, ambition, the past, the future.

The film has a special resonance for Soraya as her father was on set for the shooting of the sleeper carriage scene.
