GRAYSON PERRY : THE VANITY OF SMALL DIFFERENCES

The Vanity of Small Differences is a series of six large-scale tapestries by the Turner-Prize winning artist Grayson Perry.

Inspired by William Hogarth's A Rake's *Progress*, the tapestries, each measuring 2m x 4m, chart the 'class journey' made by young Tim Rakewell and include many of the characters, incidents and objects Perry encountered on journeys through Sunderland, Tunbridge Wells, and The Cotswolds for the television series All in the Best Possible Taste with Grayson Perry.

The programmes were first aired on Channel 4 in June 2012. In the series, Perry goes on 'a safari amongst the taste tribes of Britain', to gather inspiration for his artwork, literally weaving the characters he meets into a narrative, with an attention to the minutiae of contemporary taste every bit as acute as that in Hogarth's 18th century paintings.

A taster of bigger things to come, the programme extends our commitment to using our partnership with the Arts Council Collection to give voice to individuals and communities whose views are often overlooked. Finally, in the garden, we reflect on artists' responses to recent events, in particular the Coronavirus epidemic and the Black Lives Matter movement, through posters and placards.

It has been an exceptionally difficult year, but join us in reflecting on the past and imagining the future we all want.

HIPPO CAMPUS: WHERE WE LEARN 8 AUG - 19 SEP

A group exhibition featuring works from the Arts Council Collection that explores alternative schooling, peer-to-peer learning and self-education. Hippo Campus looks at how we learn, where we learn, and who we learn from.

Featuring 16 artists, *Hippo Campus* includes photographs of schools and students by Vanley Burke and Tony Ray-Jones, while Emma Kay, Mariele Neudecker and Bob & Roberta Smith explore devices for learning and the fallibility of memory. Jeremy Deller and Andy Holden present mind maps and learning through popular culture, and the development of language and collaborative play are studied by Magda Stawarska-Beavan and Ryan Gander. The closure of art schools across Britain has been documented by Beck & Cornford, while Benedict Drew offers an alternative curriculum with Open School East.

Other exhibiting artists include Pavel Buchler, Tarik Chawdry, Marcus Coates, Idle Women. Rachael Jones, Simon Patterson and Libuse Taylor.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S ART PRIZE 8 AUG - 19 SEP

WHAT'S YOUR ISSUE? Celebrating the tenth anniversary of our popular Cornwall-wide art prize for young people between the age of 11 and 19, this year's theme focusses on the art of protest, with more than 100 shortlisted works on display. Thanks to Classic Cottages and GreatArt for supporting the Young People's Art Prize, and helping to nurture creative talent in the region.

Go On Being So is curated by the MBA Collective, a group of art, photography and graphics students from Mounts Bay Academy aged between 12 and 16 years.

An incidental conversation between the 14 students around what it means to be a global citizen was the starting point for their exploration of the Arts Council Collection, bringing together an intriguing selection of works that say something about the world today and their place in it. MBA Collective looked for works which resonated with them. while also considering pieces that illustrated issues other young people in different parts of the world may be facing.

The title Go On Being So refers to a quest for strength and resilience, as demonstrated in works such as Karl Ohiri's How to Mend A Broken Heart, and Rod Dickinson's Egg Bag.

The title also acts as a provocation, reflected in works such as Gavin Janties' Freedom Hunters and Donald Rodney's Self Portrait: Black Men Public Enemy.
